When Training is Real

You never know what a day has in store for you. Most days; you get up, go to work, come home, go to bed. With normal, everyday stuff happening in between. Training days are special though. They take months to plan for and require good participation to be effective.

Saturday, May 18, 2013 was set to be a multi agency training day with North Baldwin Sheriffs SAR, Daphne SAR, Mobile Co. Flotilla, U.S.C.G., Escambia SAR (Florida not Alabama) and a couple of the local VFD's.

The scenario was that two kayakers had left Hurricane Landing (30.841189,-87.902666) for a day trip of the Tensaw Delta and were to be picked up at the Crossover Landing (30.679279,-87.992606) on the causeway at around 1700 hrs. They didn't make it that far. The weather went south and it started raining (thunderstorms) and is/was still raining Saturday morning when we got the call to respond.

OK, good plan. Everything is set up and the General Briefing is 0800 hrs but just before that we get a call from Escambia SAR (Florida not Alabama) saying that they would not be attending the training because of a missing autistic child in Perdido Key, FL. And could we help with the search?

So pack everything up and head south to the Gulf.

Details of the search (actual, not the planned training) were that a young boy and his mother were in Perdido Key, FL. from their home in L.A. for vacation. The boy is an 8year old , 45 lb, white male, with autism. He and his mother had been playing on the beach Friday morning. They came in for lunch, even though the boy wanted to stay on the beach, and his mother lay down with him to take a nap after lunch in their condo (30.281943°, -87.513036). When she awoke, the boy could not be found. The first day was spent trying to get clues for a direction of travel. Several dog teams were employed along with dozens of ground search teams. Two of the dog teams indicated that the boy had walked across the road to a pier. Both Daphne SAR and North Baldwin SAR scanned the area with SI sonar but did not find anything too promising so we dove just to be sure.

On Saturday evening, a credible witness came forward to say that he had seen the boy Friday afternoon playing on the beach (30.282305°, -87.508315°). As the Gulf was pretty rough at this time, a plan was made to come back early Sunday morning to, hopefully, catch the water a little calmer (Gulf winds vs. Land winds) and use both SI sonar and spotters in boats to search the Gulf Beach. If you know anything about scanning on a lake or river, scanning the waters of the Gulf of Mexico is nothing like that. It was relatively calm (1-2 ft waves). Yea, that's right. And we are scanning crossways to the waves and the wind. We came in for lunch and were getting ready to go back out when the boy was found, drowned, in the surf.

There was no evidence of foul play and from what we could tell, he was another victim of rip currents.

Let me take this opportunity to talk a little about Rip currents. Rip currents are extremely dangerous. The problem is that they can exist even when the sky is blue and the birds are chirping and everything about the day is seemingly beautiful. People, listen to me. Rip currents are deadly. Check the local broadcast or printed media for weather to see the surf zone forecast. Look for the flags on the beach. If the flags are anything other than green, stay out of the water. Go online to <http://www.srh.noaa.gov/data/MOB/SRFMOB> and look for this section ...

I don't care how good a swimmer you are, you are not that good. How deep is safe when rip currents exist? If the water gets up to your ankles, you're too deep. There have been at least 7 drownings this year and most were good swimmers. What gets me is when someone spots a shark, everyone gets out of the water. When someone spots a rip current (red flag) not everyone takes it serious. No shark attacks this year, but 7 drownings due to rip currents.

Dale was survived by his wife and three sons, Tanner, Dakota, and Avery. The Morgan County Rescue Squad would like to thank all the Public Safety agencies that participated in Dale's funeral procession.

South Marengo Fire and Rescue Squad

The South Marengo Fire and Rescue Squad of Sweet Water, Alabama is excited to announce the arrival of our newest addition to our vehicle inventory. On December 8th we were delivered our new Pierce fire pumper/tanker. This pumper is mounted on an International extended cab chassis and has top mount fire controls. The body has full height compartments on both sides to maximize storage space. The pumper has a 1250gpm Waterous pump, 1230 gallon water tank and a 20 gallon foam cell. This pumper will replace our current 1980 pumper truck that has outlived its service to our community.

This pumper truck was obtained with the help of the Assistance to Firefighters Grant which is issued by FEMA. Through this grant our department was also able to purchase a new computer system for our station for training and record keeping as well as physicals for the drivers for our equipment. The truck was purchased through Emergency Equipment Professionals' Alabama office in Pelham. The new apparatus will join a fleet consisting of two water tankers, one brush truck and one rescue truck.

The South Marengo Fire and Rescue Squad, located near Sweet Water, was established in 1975 and provides fire, rescue, and EMS first response. The department is lead by President Richard Rogers, Vice President James Williams, Board of Trustee members, Greg Rogers, John Sommer, Willie Eirby, Linzell Tucker, and Joe Easley, Fire Chief James Gates and Secretary Jackie Williams. The department has a membership of 53 members which includes active, support, and junior members.

April 27, 2011
Ider Rescue Squad

April 27, 2011. That day changed so much in our area. Even though Ider was spared for the most part, a lot of our surrounding communities were hit hard with such devastation from the tornadoes. Lives were lost, homes and businesses were demolished, and the landscape became a scarred reminder of nature's fury.

Ider Rescue Squad members responded quickly that day, but the work they started continued for over a year. Squad members began cooking within two days and served up to 1800 meals each day to anyone in need of food. The squad's building became a hub of activity as a place to get a meal, pick up water and supplies, to get a hot shower, and to meet friends and neighbors to share stories of survival and loss.

After the power was restored one week later, the obvious need to continue feeding the community was even stronger. As volunteers came to our area to assist with the clean-up, and later to help rebuild, Ider Rescue Squad still offered warm, home-style cooked meals as a way of thanking them for their contributions.

From this year long commitment to help, a new idea was born. A committee comprised of Joy Wooten, Donald Smith, George Roberts, Jason Mitchell, and then Captain Jason Heard, developed plans to build a larger, improved kitchen in order to expand the squad's ability to serve our community.

By generous donations, hard work, volunteered labor, donated supplies and services, that dream became a reality. In May of this year, the Ider Rescue Squad proudly revealed it's new, state approved, commercial style kitchen.

We do not look forward to another disaster, but yet, we stand ready to serve once again.

Missing Man at Talladega Race Track

It was during the NASCAR Nationwide Series weekend on May 4 at Talladega and a 28-year-old Plainfield, Indiana native was last seen at about 11 p.m., sitting in a lawn chair at the South Park campground at the Talladega Superspeedway. Bower was reported missing from the Speedway the following day. Etowah County Rescue Squad got a call from the Talladega Sheriff's Department Tuesday May 6, requesting help on a missing man, believed to be drowned. The search had begun when Bower did not return to the campsite Sunday morning and was reported missing. Captain Mike Bettis had the tones set off around 3:00 pm and members quickly responded and were on the site by 5:15 pm ready to work. It takes about one hour to drive to this site from our building. Captain Bettis then met at the incident command post for a briefing and informed them of all available resources we had and could get with a phone call.

The ECRS worked several days covering a bit more than 3 miles of swift moving water of the Choccolocco Creek. We were told that this creek was just short of having the required measurements to entitle it to be legally called a river. Squad members waded in the creek used side sonar equipment and found that the creek had a rather hard smooth bottom causing us to think Bower could have moved down creek quite a ways with this current. There was a spillway damn about 3 miles from where the victim was last seen. For the next few days the ECRS worked in and had to deal with more rain fall. The water temperature was rather chilling also. Tuesday morning plans were to work the dam area hard, moving debris that had piled up so things could pass over the dam. The ECRS and others are all happy that everything ended up okay and all personnel and dogs were safe. At 11:49 a.m. on May 14, 2013, Bower's body was spotted by someone in a Sheriff's helicopter floating in Choccolocco Creek just down below the dam. This was a 10 day mission, the ECRS worked during the last 7 days and had several new members to get their eyes opened in many ways. Everyone who helped out with this search we were glad you were there.

Word of caution to everyone who reads this: Please when you're working around a damn like this remember, it may look smooth and easy but it is very deceiving. Be Careful!! Also, remember to use the chain of command on missions. Reason being, the commander should know where everyone is at and have communications set up with each group. They can then make contact to keep everyone updated on how events are going and who needs help or let you know if the mission is over. Accountability and Safety!

It is sad when things like this happen but we as Volunteers do this for the families so that they can have closure. When any person in any position says or does anything to belittle the volunteer search and rescue people of any state, they need to go talk to the victim's family members for their opinion about having a bunch of volunteers come do this humane act of kindness and not be sending them a bill for services rendered. I ask how can department heads, politicians, or anyone not support people like us? The only reason I can think of is they must be thinking how we (volunteers) are keeping someone from making money off of these hours of services rendered! Our thoughts and prayers are with the family and friends of Nicholas Bower.

Talladega Sheriff's Department showed their appreciation to our squad for working with them on this search by inviting us and everyone else involved, to a lunch at the race track. Thanks you for such kindness.

On our way back from the Talladega lunch we made it to Lincoln when we became the first on the scene where two young people had just run off the road. They had somehow missed their turn running off into a deep ditch. After sizing up the scene for safety and finding out no one had any injuries we made contact with 911. We no more than got off the phone when a wrecker came driving by and we were able to get him to stop. Then law enforcement happened by and we were set, can you believe this luck? ECRS members worked traffic and assisted everyone in any way needed.


